Advent 4

Today we reach the fourth Sunday of Advent and the climax of our Advent journey through those who were part of God's preparation for the coming of his son – Abraham, the other patriarchs and David; the prophets; John the Baptist; and today, as we light the final Advent candle, Mary the mother of Jesus.

But on the threshold of the celebration of Christmas, it's not really Mary we're celebrating today – there are plenty of other opportunities to do that in the course of the church year. Rather, the stories Luke gives us about Mary in the opening chapter of his gospel – the Annunciation (Gabriel's appearance to Mary) and, in today's gospel reading, Mary's visit to Elizabeth and the song of Mary that we know as the Magnificat – seek to draw us, like Mary, into a new relationship with God revealed in Jesus, a God who chooses the ordinary through whom to do extraordinary things. They present us with both an opportunity and a challenge: an opportunity to consider our understanding of the nature of God, who since the time of Abraham has been a God of justice and compassion, who hears the cry of the oppressed and calls people to join with him in turning the values of the world upside down, and a challenge as to how we respond to his continuing call today.

who are one of the little clans of Judah,

one who is to rule in Israel,
whose origin is from of old,
from ancient days.
Therefore he shall give them up until the time

when she who is in labour has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel.

And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God.

And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth; and he shall be the one of peace.

Luke 1:39-55

Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.'

And Mary said,

'My soul magnifies the Lord,

and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour,

for he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant.

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed;

for the Mighty One has done great things for me,

and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him

from generation to generation.

He has shown strength with his arm;

he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'
